## Summary

One of the longest and most precedential legislative sessions in Arizona's history, the 48<sup>th</sup> Legislature, 2<sup>nd</sup> Regular Session finally adjourned *sine die* on Friday, June 27, 2008 at 10:09 PM. This marks the fourth longest session in Arizona's history, and one of the most interesting.

This session is a glimpse into the future of potentiality in creative parliamentary tactics and rule interpretation.

Bills held in caucus, threats of filibuster, engaging in filibuster, engagement in infinite Senate COW debate, improper cessation of Senate COW debate, 200+ calls for 'division' in one day (forces members to stand and sit) surpassing caucus and failed committee hearings, crying, anger, microphone throwing, referring to fellow party members as Viet Cong, appropriation hearings on what would happen in the event of a government shut-down, long-winded explanation of a vote, talks of government conspiracy and UFOs regarding the 9-11 incident, refusing to yield to other members, the chair refusing recognition of members, and just when we thought it would be over.....it never was....

Of all the bills and memorials posted, only **22%** were signed into law, or passed by the respective bodies.

**91%** of all bills passed were signed by the Governor, and hence will be enacted into law. There are a few of the agency's bills which have a specified enactment date of January 1, 2009.

Memorials and Resolutions are exempt from the Governor's signature. Subsequently, of those voted on this session, the legislature passed 18%.

### **Governor's Nominee to the Arizona Game and Fish Commission**

Gov. Janet Napolitano recently appointed Norman W. Freeman of Chino Valley to serve on the Arizona Game and Fish Commission. He replaces Michael Golightly, whose term expired this year after a 15 year tenure on the Commission.

The governor nominated Freeman on Feb. 20, and his nomination was transmitted to the Arizona Senate for confirmation. The Senate took no formal action during the legislative session, so in accordance with A.R.S. § 38-211 (B), the governor made the appointment, effective July 2.

Commissioner Freeman's nomination will be transmitted to the Senate again for consideration during the 2009 session.

## Proposed Legislation

*Bill Summaries and Dispositions*

*Commission Opposed Bills:*

### ■ **H2256: GAME AND FISH; SENIOR HUNTERS**

Sponsor: Representative Jerry Weiers

Summary: The Game and Fish Commission can issue a complimentary license to a person 65 or older who has held a class G general hunting license (Pioneer license) consecutively for the 5 preceding years. Previously, the Commission could issue complimentary licenses to a person 70 or older who had been an Arizona resident for 25 years or more. This bill has no effect on previously issued complimentary licenses.

*Disposition: 2-6-08 Held in House Natural Resources*

### ■ **HCR2004: APPROPRIATION OF FEDERAL MONIES**

Sponsor: Representative Andy Biggs

Summary: The 2008 general election ballot is to carry the question of whether to amend statutes to specify that "noncustodial federal monies" be appropriated by the Legislature. "Noncustodial federal monies" is defined as block grants, revenue sharing, all monies that are the federal portion of a federal program requiring a local match, and monies provided for which the federal government gives the state "broad authority to make spending decisions." Exemptions are provided for research grants to universities and to the Dept of Emergency and Military Affairs, and federal money awarded directly to school districts.

*Disposition: 2-13-08 Received a do pass from House Appropriations. Never Calendared*

### ■ **HCR2037: CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHTS; GAME & FISH**

Sponsor: Representative Jerry Weiers

Summary: The 2008 general election ballot is to carry the question of whether to amend the state Constitution to state that hunting and fishing are the preferred means of managing non-threatened wildlife and that the rights of citizens to hunt and fish on public and private property, consistent with the laws of trespass, shall not be impaired.

**Disposition: 3-24-08 Failed House COW after adopting amendment #4522. Roll Call Vote 27-28.**

## ■ **S1264: RIGHTS OF WAY; PUBLIC LANDS**

Sponsor: Senator Karen Johnson

Summary: The bill would have asserted a claim by the state, on behalf of itself or its political subdivisions, to rights-of-way across public lands beginning from the effective date of the Mining Law of 1866 to the repeal of a provision in that act in 1976. A list of the ways by which the claims might be established would have included: use by the state with intention of establishing a public highway; inclusion of the right-of-way on an official map or plat, or execution of a memorandum of understanding with an agency of the federal government. [Capitol Reports note: Senate research staff says nationwide there are numerous disputes over control of these rights-of-way.]

**Disposition: 5/27/08 Vetoed**

**GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE:** Much of the land affected by this bill is in the hands of various private owners, Indian tribes, the federal government, the military and the state. For the state to dispute and courts to adjudicate every right-of-way created during the 110 year period covered by this bill "would create unnecessary uncertainty" for current land holders. She also said her veto does not preclude the state's ability to assert a claim in specific cases.

## ■ **H2024: MEGAN EVANS' LAW**

Sponsor: Representative Tom

Summary: All new and used motorized watercraft sold in the state shall display carbon monoxide warning stickers, and a carbon monoxide brochure shall be provided to new owners of a new or used motorized watercraft. While the engine of a motorized watercraft is in operations, a person shall not do any of the following behind the craft: 1) occupy the swim platform, ladder or step; 2) swim near the craft's exhaust ports; 3) Hang on the craft's swim platform, ladder or step if the craft is in motion; or 4) Body surf in the wake of the craft. This act is to be called Megan Evans' Law (named for a 7-year old girl from Flagstaff who died at Lake Powell from carbon monoxide poisoning in July 2007). Emergency clause.

**Disposition: 02/18/08 Additionally assigned to House Judiciary**

## ■ **H2067: GAME AND FISH; GUIDE LICENSES**

Sponsor: Representative Jerry Weiers

Summary: The penalties the Dept of Game and Fish may imposed upon a licensed guide are statutorily prescribed.

Disposition: 05/20/08 Provisions were included in HB2251. Later used a vehicle for another agency's legislation.

## ■ **H2068: GAME AND FISH; PRIVATE ENTERPRISE; FUND**

Sponsor: Representative Jerry Weiers

Summary: Establishes the Youth and Women's Shooting Sports Fund, consisting of the net profits from the sale of goods or services (excluding firearms) at shooting ranges owned by the Game and Fish Commission. The fund is administered by the Commission and used to encourage youth and women to participate in shooting sports. AS PASSED HOUSE.

***Disposition: 3-24-08 Additionally assigned to Senate Appropriations***

## ■ **H2251 GAME & FISH OMNIBUS**

Sponsor: Representative Jerry Weiers

Summary: Various changes to statutes relating to game and fish, including rewriting language pertaining to voluntary and mandatory training courses offered by the Game and Fish Commission; expanding the types of licenses a child is permitted to hold that will enable the child to take big game on the permit or tag granted to the child's parent/guardian or grandparent. Also establishes an apprentice hunting license valid for two days. The license is granted to a mentor with certain limitations (an apprentice is limited to one such license per year; a mentor may not apply for more than two apprentice licenses per year). Punishments for violation of regulations related to licensed guides are rewritten to state that a first time violation may result in a 5-year suspension of the right of the person to secure a guide license; a second violation increases the suspension to 10 years; a third may result in a permanent denial of license. Removes migratory birds from the list of game permitted to be taken by holders of certain classes of license. Effective January 1, 2009. AS SIGNED BY GOVERNOR.

***Disposition: 4-15-08 Signed by Governor. Chapter 37, Laws 2008***

## ■ **H2395: DUI; OUI**

Sponsor: Speaker Jim Weiers

Summary: Would have made numerous changes to statutes governing operating a watercraft while intoxicated (OUI) and driving while intoxicated (DUI), including increasing penalties for OUI, requiring persons whose licenses had been suspended to complete an alcohol or drug screening, education or treatment program before the license may be reinstated, and changing the period of required use of an ignition interlock device to 6 months from one year if the person successfully completed a drug or alcohol treatment or education program.

***Disposition: 4-29-08 Vetoed (see bill H2643)***

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE SAID: it is premature to change the law regarding how long a person convicted of DUI should have an ignition interlock device installed on his/her vehicle. She said the one year period as established in legislation in 2007 has been in effect for less than a year, and no one can be certain of its effect on public safety.

## ■ **H2573: OFF-HIGHWAY VEHICLES; USER FEE**

Sponsor: Representative Jerry Weiers

Summary: Effective January 1, 2009, changes in various statutes related to operation and regulation of off-highway vehicles, including a requirement that off-highway vehicles display a sticker (or indicia) issued by the Department of Transportation which shall establish a fee for the indicia. Proceeds from the sale of indicia will be used by the State Land Department to mitigate the impact of vehicles on its land. Off-highway vehicles must have certain equipment, and minors operating an off-highway vehicle must wear helmets. Violations are considered civil traffic violations. New license plates to be designed by the Dept of Transportation will replace current plates and are no longer valid for the life of the vehicle. Off-highway vehicles are subject to a vehicle license tax of \$3 instead of the regular VLT rate. It is a class 3 (lowest) misdemeanor to drive an off-highway vehicle in a manner that damages the environment where it is prohibited by rule, regulation, ordinance or code. AS PASSED HOUSE.

***Disposition: 3-19-08 Failed Senate Natural Resources Recorded Vote: 3-3 (see bill S1167)***

## ■ **H2643 (Chapter 256): DUI, OUI; RESTAURANT LIQUOR LICENSES**

Sponsor: Representative Crandall

Summary: Makes numerous changes in DUI and OUI (Operating a Boat Under the Influence) statutes, including making penalties for OUI the same as for DUI. The driver license of a person whose license was suspended or revoked for an alcohol or drug related offense may be reinstated only after completion of court-ordered alcohol or drug screening. A judge's discretion to reduce jail time for certain first or second offense DUIs is deleted. The sunset date of the program whereby the Dept of Liquor License and Control may annually approve up to 15 special liquor licenses for restaurants that do not meet the requirement that food sales account for at least 40% of gross revenues is extended five years to June 30, 2013, from June 30, 2008. Adds a provision requiring that 5% of the annual liquor license fee paid by a restaurant whose gross proceeds from non-alcohol related sales do not comply with statutory minimums be deposited in the DUI Abatement Fund.

***Disposition: 6-6-08 Signed by Governor. Chapter 256, Laws 2008***

## ■ **S1080: OPERATING UNDER THE INFLUENCE; WATERCRAFT**

Sponsor: Senator Linda Gray

Summary: Makes numerous changes to statutes regarding operating a watercraft while intoxicated, including establishing sentences of incarceration for convicted persons; making a convicted person ineligible for work/school release or home detention; eliminating the civil penalty for refusing to submit to blood alcohol testing; and increasing additional assessments for convictions of operating a watercraft while intoxicated. The time period within which a second or subsequent offense may trigger enhanced punishment is lengthened to 84 months from 60 months. AS PASSED SENATE.

*Disposition: 3-25-08 Triple Assigned-House Government, Commerce and Transportation (see bill H2643)*

## ■ **S1167 (Chapter 294): OFF-HIGHWAY VEHICLES; USER FEE**

Sponsor: Senator Linda Gray

Summary: Effective January 1, 2009, changes in various statutes related to operation and regulation of off-highway vehicles, including a requirement that off-highway vehicles display a sticker (or indicia) issued by the Department of Transportation, which shall establish a fee for the indicia. Seventy percent of revenue derived from the sale of indicia is deposited in the Off-Highway Vehicle Registration (OHVR) Fund, and 30% goes to the Highway User Revenue Fund. Monies in the OHVR Fund are re-allocated as follows: 5% to the State Land Department to mitigate the impact of vehicles on its land; and 35% (formerly 30%) for programs related to the safe and environmentally responsible use of off-highway vehicles. The share distributed to state parks is reduced to 60% from 70% with a 12% cap (formerly 18%) to fund staff support to administer the fund. The list of permitted uses of monies in the fund by the Parks Board is expanded. Off-highway vehicles must have stipulated equipment (brakes, headlights spark arrestor, safety flag, etc.), and minors operating an off-highway vehicle must wear helmets. It is a class 3 (lowest) misdemeanor to drive an off-highway vehicle in a manner that damages the environment or where it is prohibited by rule, regulation, ordinance or code. Violations not otherwise classified are considered civil traffic violations. New license plates to be designed by the Dept of Transportation will replace current plates, and the \$8 fee is no longer valid for the life of the vehicle. Off-highway vehicles are subject to a vehicle license tax of \$3 instead of the regular VLT rate.

*Disposition: 6-27-08 Signed by Governor. Chapter 294, Laws 2008*

# Legislation

## Evaluation and Analysis

This portion of the report contains data that has been compiled and cleaned by the Department, and used to describe correlations of various variables related to Legislators' votes and perspective. The data source is the recorded votes for both Committee Hearings and Floor Actions where specified.

**The 'Bill Progress' report** includes the bills supported and opposed by the Commission this Session. Also included in the following detailed report is explanation of status for each of the bills. It is important to note bills such as OUI, and OHV have several versions in the spreadsheets below including the final versions signed into law. This data is important for several reasons, but also to show the efforts made by staff to pass legislation in any way possible by using procedural tactics at times, to circumvent vehement dissent by some of the members.

**The 'Legislator Vote Analysis'** and the following distribution diagrams analyze individual Legislator positions regarding Commission/Department interests based on their votes for third and final readings of bills. The bills which were struck onto others as they moved through the legislative process are not included in the analysis. Scoring premises are as follows:

- For bills that the Commission opted to support; Legislators who voted in favor (yea) received a '1' and contrarily those who voted against (nay) received a '0.'
- The inverse applies to votes from legislators on bills that the Commission opted to oppose. So a Legislator who voted against (nay) an opposed position received a '1' and those in favor (yea) received a '0.'

- Of the 7 bills used in this analysis, all 7 had a 3<sup>rd</sup>/final read in the House, and only 4 had a 3<sup>rd</sup>/final read in the Senate.
- NV-‘No Vote’ is the absence of a vote, which in the analysis was subtracted from the number of ‘total possible votes.’

The remaining addendums are analyses of various bivariate associations displaying various frequencies of dependent variables. On those diagrams, the aforesaid information applies.

## Session Highlights

As stated before, this session was marked with several unusual occurrences. The Department’s Legislative staff spent a great deal of resource and time on S1167-the OHV bill. This was the bill’s 4<sup>th</sup> year of action, and with the fortunate absence of Senators who threatened to kill the bill, it finally passed.

Senator Linda Gray has been an incredible champion for Department bills this session. Not only has she extended herself to be available whenever we have called, even at her home; she has also bravely endured the criticism of certain legislation from her fellow party members.

Senator Gray, with integrity has been an advocate, and has played a pivotal role in negotiating and passing many of these bills.

Representative Jerry Weiers sponsored several of the Department’s bills this session, and is always amenable to agency request to do so.

## Budget

The FY07-08/08-09 budgets were approved by the legislature with no room or time to spare. At the 9<sup>th</sup> hour, Senators Gould and Harper were creative, using parliamentary tactics to stall the FY-09 budget. Arizona Game and Fish received fund sweeps of approximately \$8 million dollars primarily from the watercraft and OHV funds.

In one of the worst fiscal crises in the state’s history including a 2.2 billion dollar deficit, many general fund agencies were hit extremely hard, including employee lay-offs (FTE sweeps).

# Findings

The overall Legislature votes that were in line with Department bills were >75% as opposed to their approval of all proposed legislation of only approximately 22%. The votes for Department bills are represented in the tables/appendices herein, and do not include votes on those duplicate bills, which were later struck onto other bills. The House chamber tended to vote more in line with Department bills with an average of 79%, and the Senate chamber votes averaged approximately 61%

Interestingly the Democratic Party, by large margin, tended to vote with agency bills than the GOP.

- Democrats 91.9%
- Republicans 61.7%


