Introduction

It is important to periodically evaluate our ability to communicate our position on issues with the state legislature. The legislative voting record on these issues is one way to measure our effectiveness in communicating our position. The following is a list of legislative voting records from the second regular session (2004) for issues on which the Game and Fish Commission has taken a formal position. A brief summary of the bills/issues is also included.

Key to the Tables on the Following Pages

S = Legislator signed on as a sponsor of the particular legislation.

2 points per legislation sponsored added to weighted score

+ = Voted with the formal position taken by the Commission.

- = Voted against the formal position taken by the Commission.

***** = No vote was taken in Committee or on the floor, or the member was absent when the vote was taken.

Because not all bills impact the department to an equal degree, the bills are assigned a level of impact in order to distinguish between more important bills in which that the department sought more support. The votes on all bills are weighted in accordance with the degree of impact on the department. The weighting scale is as follows:

Bill of <u>NORMAL</u> Impact:	Vote in favor of Game and Fish +1	Against Game and Fish position -1
Bill of <u>MEDIUM</u> Impact:	Vote in favor of Game and Fish +3	Against Game and Fish position -3
Bill of <u>HIGH</u> Impact:	Vote in favor of Game and Fish +6	Against Game and Fish position -6

A bill sponsor will receive 2 additional points per bill sponsorship

Total Points = Total number of weighted points versus the total number of weighted points possible (excluding points possible from bill sponsorship) if the legislator were to consistently vote in favor of the department.

% of Points Agreed = Agreement between legislators voting record and Commission positions on legislation. This number is derived by dividing the weighted points earned by the legislator by the amount of weighted points possible out of the votes in which the legislator participated.

Agreement/Actions = Number of times legislators voted in agreement with the Commission's position versus the number of times legislators actually voted on Department policy.

% Agreement = Agreement between legislators voting record and Commission positions on the issues. This number is derived by dividing the number of a legislator's actions (votes and/or sponsorship) that agrees with the Commission position by the total number of actions taken by the legislator on these issues.

Note: This scorecard is not intended to be used in judging legislators, but rather, our ability to effectively communicate our position on issues. Also, these calculations do not take into account work that goes on behind the scene on legislative issues (i.e., helping a bill be heard and debated).

H2076: Bank Accounts; State Agencies (Chapter 160, Laws 2004)

(Representative Huppenthal) With the exception of specifically named entities, bank accounts for all state agencies shall be deposited with and remain in the custody of the state treasurer or in an account authorized by the state treasurer. The 4 retirement systems are added to the list of exceptions. Additionally, makes changes in the way state agencies handle credit card transactions, for example, outlines the process by which discount, processing and convenience fees (each separately defined) are deducted from an original transaction amount and prohibits the deduction of a processing fee from a transaction before depositing the net amount in the appropriate state fund.

H2158: Shooting Range Preservation (Chapter 112, Laws 2004)

(Representatives Nelson, Arnold, Hanson; Senator Martin) The land-use plan for Phoenix must include protection from encroaching development for the Ben Avery Shooting Range (state-owned range inside or adjacent to municipal boundaries before Jan 1, 2004). The Game & Fish Commission shall forward the legal description of the shooting range to the city attorney. For each property within one half mile of the shooting range, the city must record (among other items) the legal description of the range, a notice that the subject property is located within one half mile of the range, that it may be subject to increased noise, and that there are restrictions on the uses of the property. The State Game & Fish Commission cannot close the range without approval of the Governor. **Signed by Governor Napolitano 4/19/04**

Impact Level: HIGH (Yes vote +6, No vote -6)

H2184: DUI Council and Fund (Chapter 254, Laws 2004)

(Representatives L. Gray) The oversight council of state and local officials and legislators on driving under the influence, which self-repealed Jan. 1, 2004, is revived. Membership is expanded from 5 to 7 voting members (there are 3 additional members who serve in a non-voting advisory capacity) by adding both a municipal and a county law enforcement officer. Distributions from the DUI abatement fund are revised so that 70% (prev 50%) can be used for grants to local governments, including tribal governments; 25% (prev 50%) for program support, and 5% for administrative purposes. The operator of a watercraft who refuses to submit to a blood alcohol test is fined an additional \$500 which goes to the Prison Construction Fund (the total civil penalty is \$1250). Provisions that the amount in the watercraft license fund in excess of \$290,000 must be used for boating safety education programs are deleted. Courts must keep a record of each violation of boating DUI statutes and must report to ADOT on the disposition of each case within 10 days. **Signed by Governor Napolitano 5/28/04**

H2244: Water Rights, Zuni Settlement (Chapter 93, Laws 2004)

(Representatives Konopnicki, Downing, Hanson, Hubbs, O'Halleran)

A water right may be severed from land and transferred to an Indian tribe (or the US in trust for the tribe) under prescribed conditions (e.g., approval of Congress and of the owner of the right). Severed and transferred rights cannot exceed 3,600 acre-feet, cannot be used for irrigation of crops, must be used for vegetative restoration and wildlife, and is subject to approval by a court of competent jurisdiction, or if none, by the director of the department of water resources. Authority to sever and transfer a right granted by this act expires Jan 1, 2020. (Legislative research staff indicates this bill enacts provisions of a multi-party water settlement on behalf of the Zuni Reservation in Apache County.) **Signed by Governor Napolitano 4/16/04**

Impact Level: NORMAL (Yes vote +1, No vote -1)

H2382: Social Security Numbers, Government Use (Chapter 139, Laws 2004)

(Representatives C. Gray, Biggs, Downing, Hubbs, Huffman, Pearce, Quelland; Senator Jarrett) Except for specifically enumerated exceptions, government agencies are prohibited from transmitting material than contains both an individual's social security number and financial institution account number. Restrictions on the use of a person's social security number are waived only for purposes of administering employee payroll as well as to the Dept of Revenue and all law enforcement agencies (currently, the waiver extends to all agencies of the state as well as municipalities, counties and other political subdivisions). These state agencies and local governments are permitted to disseminate or use only the last 4 digits of a person's social security number. **Signed by Governor Napolitano 4/23/04**

Impact Level: NORMAL (Yes vote +1, No vote -1)

H2483: Off-Highway Vehicles (Chapter 145, Laws 2004)

(Representatives Konopnicki, Flake, Jayne, Thompson) Local traffic authorities may designate street routes for off-highway vehicle drivers to use to gain access to off-highway recreation facilities or special events. An off-highway vehicle does not have to be licensed when participating in a special event nor is it necessary to have insurance. **Signed by Governor Napolitano 4/23/04**

Impact Level: NORMAL (Yes vote +1, No vote -1)

H 2549: Forest Management (Chapter 326, Laws 2004)

(Representatives Chase, A Aguirre, Allen, Alvarez, Arnold, Bradley, Burns, Bustamante, Carruthers, Flake, L. Gray, Hubbs, Jackson, Jayne, Johnson, Konopnicki, Landrum Taylor, Mason, McClure, Nelson, Prezelski, Thompson, Wagner; Arzberger, Bennett, Blendu, Brotherton, Brown, Cannell, Jarrett, Weiers)

The state forester is required to identify areas including deep forest and the "urban interface" for pilot programs to promote forest health. Programs must harvest trees in a manner that is science based and environmentally sensitive. Programs must explore public-private partnerships, work with federal agencies, and maximize state fire assistance grants. Interim report to the Legislature and Executive by Nov 1, 2004; final report is due by Nov. 1, 2005. **Signed by Governor Napolitano 6/3/04**

S1394: Committees & Commissions; Repeal (Chapter 20, Laws 2004)

(Senator Harper) Repeals various inactive committees and commissions: specifically, the marriage and communication skills commission after Aug 31, 2009; the state-county fiscal committee after Sept 30, 2004; the joint committee on welfare reform after Dec 31, 2008; the joint legislative review committee on game and fish fees from Sept 30, 2004; the study committee on the funding of hospitals and senior centers on Indian reservations after Sept 30, 2009; and the vehicle emission identification, testing and repair study oversight committee from Sept 30, 2004. **Signed by Governor Napolitano 3/30/04**

H2137: Game & Fish Commission Members

(Representatives Nelson, Arnold, Hanson, Hubbs, Jayne, Robson, Stump) A member of the state Game & Fish Commission is limited to three full terms. Length of term is reduced to 4 years from 5 years. Current terms of members are not affected by the change in term length. **Died in Senate Natural Resources & Transportation Committee 4/6/04**

Impact Level: MEDIUM (Yes vote +3, No vote -3)

H2179: Hunting; Transfer Permit

(Representatives Biggs, Burns, Graf, C. Gray, Hart, Jackson, Johnson, Straughn, Stump)
The Arizona Game and Fish Commission may establish procedures whereby a big game permit or tag may be transferred to a qualified organization for use by a minor child who has a life threatening medical condition. **Held in Senate Natural Resources & Transportation Committee 3/1/04**

Impact Level: NORMAL (Yes vote +1, No vote -1)

H2307 Fire Districts, Lake improvement Funds

(Representatives Wagner, Nelson, O'Halleran, Pearce) A fire district may apply for money from the Lake Improvement Fund to pay for water search and rescue. **Held in Senate Finance Committee 4/8/04**

Impact Level: NORMAL (Yes vote +1, No vote -1)

*H2307 as written was officially opposed by the Game and Fish department, however Senators agreed to change the bill in the next committee in a way that Game and Fish favored, thus votes in favor of the bill (although identified as being against the department's position) are in fact interpreted to be in agreement with the department's position.

H 2361: State Agencies, Outside Council, Procurement

(Representatives Biggs, Quelland) State agencies authorized to retain outside counsel to perform legal services must comply with provisions of the state procurement code and must submit copies of the RFP and name of the proposed outside counsel to JLBC. At conclusion of the proceeding, outside counsel must submit a detailed statement of hours worked, expenses, etc. If the proceeding is a contingent fee case, the state agency is prohibited from paying an hourly rate in excess of \$500. **Held in House Government & Retirement Committee 2/10/04**

Impact Level: NORMAL (Yes vote +1, No vote -1)

H 2364: Federal Monies; Appropriation

(Representatives Biggs, C Gray, Quelland) Prohibits public officers and employees, consultants or independent contractors retained by public officers or employees, state agencies, departments, boards or commissions and political subdivisions from lobbying the Legislature. **Died in House 26-31; motion to reconsider failed; bill cannot be considered again 2/16/04**

Impact Level: HIGH (Yes vote +6, No vote -6)

H 2566: Land Conservation Tax Credit

(Representatives Rosati, Barnes, Boone, L. Gray, Hubbs, Huppenthal, Jayne, O'Halleran, Quelland, Reagan, Straughn, Stump) A direct credit against state income tax is allowed for 30 per cent of the value of real property and improvements donated by the taxpayer for "conservation purposes", defined as preserving areas for public recreation or education, protecting habitat, and preserving open space including farm land and forest land. The credit can be carried forward five years. **Held in House Natural Resources, Agriculture, Water & Native American Affairs Committee 3/3/04**

Impact Level: NORMAL (Yes vote +1, No vote -1)

H 2643: Watercraft; Floatation Devices

(Representatives Burton Cahill, A. Aguirre, Bustamante, Gallardo, Jackson, Landrum Taylor, Lopes, Lopez, Loreda, McCune-Davis, Prezelski, Straughn; Senator Mitchell) Violations of the requirement that watercraft carry a personal flotation device for each person onboard are installed in statute as a class 2 misdemeanor. **Died in House Natural Resources, Agriculture, Water & Native American Affairs Committee 2/12/04**

Impact Level: NORMAL (Yes vote +1, No vote -1)

H 2647: Watercraft DUI

(Representatives Carruthers, A. Aguirre, Burns, Downing, Flake, McClure, Wagner; Senator Cannell, Mitchell) A centralized database for violations concerning operating watercraft under the influence is established. Courts throughout the state will report necessary information to the ADOT to maintain the database. A person arrested for DUI operation of a watercraft who refuses to submit to a test to determine blood alcohol content shall pay a civil penalty of \$500 in addition to the \$750 penalty already provided by law. **Amended to H 2184, See H2184 above summary**

Impact Level: MEDIUM (Yes vote +3, No vote -3)

HCR2016: Tax Increase by Initiative, Vote

(Representatives Biggs, C Gray, Quellan) The 2004 general election ballot is to carry the question of amending the state constitution to provide that an initiative or referendum measure that provides for a net increase in state revenue can take effect only if approved by two-thirds of voters casting ballots on the measure. **Died in House 22-35; Motion to reconsider also failed; Cannot be reconsidered again 2/16/04**

Impact Level: MEDIUM (Yes vote +3, No vote -3)

S1081: Animal & Ecological Terrorism

(Senators Verschoor, L Aguirre, Allen, Anderson, Bee, Bennett, Binder, Blendu, Brown, Burns, Cannell, Garcia, Harper, Jarrett, Martin, Miranda, Tibshraeny, Waring, Weiers; Representatives Hanson, Pearce, Quelland) A definition of "racketeering" in the criminal code would have been expanded to include "animal or ecological terrorism," defined as any felony, completed or preparatory, involving damage or injury with intent to obstruct an "animal activity", defined as any activity using animals or animal parts, including hunting, food processing and medical research. GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE said the definitions are over-broad and that Attorney General Goddard's view had been sought and that he had concluded first that existing law provides adequate protection against acts of eco-terrorism and second that "sweeping" provisions of S1081 would result in unintended consequences and would threaten protected speech. **Vetoed by Governor Napolitano 5/13/04**

Impact Level: NORMAL (Yes vote +1, No vote -1)

S1212: Forests; Healthy Forest Pilot Program

(Senators Jarrett, Bee; Representative Chase) The state forester shall establish a healthy forest pilot program to include "substantial areas of deep forest as well as the urban interface." An interim report is due by Nov 1, 2004; a final report is due Nov 1, 2005. **See H2549**

Impact Level: NORMAL (Yes vote +1, No vote -1)

S1279: Lobbyists; State Funded

(Senators Anderson, Bee, Burns, Jarrett, Martin, Verschoor, Weiers; Representatives Barnes, Biggs, Hart, Johnson, Nichols, Pearce, Quelland, Thompson) An employee of or contractor with any state agency, board or commission is prohibited from lobbying the Legislature. They may testify at hearings or communicate with lawmakers only if requested by a lawmaker and only to provide information and not to recommend action. Agency heads must annually certify to the Legislature that he or she has not "knowingly permitted unlawful lobbying" during the preceding year. State employees are permitted to speak with any member of the Legislature and participate in the legislative process if they take leave from their job for the time spent absent from their office. **Died in Senate Government Committee 2/24/04**

Impact Level: NORMAL (Yes vote +1, No vote -1)

S1347: Immunity; Public Entities

(Senators Hellon, Anderson, Bee, Burns, Harper)

Public entities and public employees are granted absolute immunity from any action or damage caused by wildlife.

Held in Senate Judiciary Committee 2/25/04

Impact Level: HIGH (Yes vote +6, No vote -6)

SCR1014: Lottery Monies, Reallocation, Raffles

(Senators Harper; Representatives Johnson, Robson) The 2004 general election ballot is to carry the question of amending the state gambling code to replace the current formula that governs distribution of state Lottery revenue with a requirement that all the revenue after Lottery Commission expenses be used either for K-12 education or road construction and renovation. The resolution also would provide in another section of law that a raffle chance cannot cost more than \$25. **Held in Senate Government Committee 2/10/04**

Impact Level: HIGH (Yes vote +6, No vote -6)

S1403: Budget; Capitol Outlay 2004-5 (Chapter 276, Laws 2004)

(Senators Burns, L Aguirre, Allen, Bee, Bennett, Brown, Cannell, Jarrett, Rios) Capital outlay appropriations for specified state agencies and departments: including \$3.5 million (from the capital outlay stabilization fund) to DOA and \$3.3 million (mostly from the state highway fund) to ADOT for major maintenance and repair of buildings; \$1.665 million to Game & Fish (mostly from the game & fish improvement fund) for 8 named projects; \$218 million (from the state highway fund) for state highway construction, and \$13.5 million (from the state aviation fund) for airport planning and development. Total capital appropriation: \$242,162,500. **Signed by Governor Napolitano 5/28/04**

Impact Level: HIGH (Yes vote +6, No vote -6)

S1411: Budget; Environmental Protection (Chapter 280, Laws 2004)

(Senators Burns, L Aguirre, Allen, Bee, Bennett, Brown, Cannell, Jarrett, Rios) WQARF will receive \$10M from corporate income tax collections but zero from sales tax or severance tax revenues. DEQ will transfer \$6.9M from the underground storage tank revolving fund for departmental administrative costs. Department of Water Resources authorized to use up to \$1.5M from the augmentation and conservation assistance fund and the dam repair fund for general operating expenses. State Parks authorized to spend (a) up to \$692,100 from the Game & Fish Dept allocation and (b) up to \$1.75M from the state lake improvement fund for general Parks Dept operating expenses. **Signed by Governor Napolitano 5/28/04**

Chart 1. Representatives' Percentage of Agreement with Game and Fish Legislation in the 46th Legislature






Chart 2. Representatives' Percentage of Unweighted Votes in Agreement with the Game and Fish Legislation in the 46th Legislature







Chart 3. Percentage of Senate Votes in Agreement with Game and Fish Position on Legislation

Chart 4. Senator's Percentage of Agreement with Game and Fish Legislation in the 46th Legislature




Chart 5. Senator's Agreement with the Game and Fish Legislation in the 46th Legislature




Chart 6. Percentage of Senate Votes in Agreement with Game and Fish on Legislation
